Practise what you teach

ast June, while doing gardening in a small piece of land at the back of my home, I disturb the habitat of a colony of mice with my garden fork. They quickly disappeared into the soil and with a guilty conscience; I was left to gaze at my ungloved hand. Throughout my thirty-six years in Environmental Health I have given hundreds of lectures, talks or cautions to individuals working in agriculture, or gardening for leisure about the dangers of not wearing protective gear. Leptospirosis is one of the diseases which rodents such as rats and mice are vectors and can be easily transmitted to human beings if we are not protected.

Leptospirosis is also known as Weil's disease or Hemorrhagic Jaundice. It is a group of Zoonotic bacterial disease with protean manifestations. Common symptoms are fever, with sudden onset headaches, chills, severe myalgia and conjunctival suffusion. What makes this disease so difficult is that it is often misdiagnosed as mengititis encephalitis or influenza. Individuals with these symptoms are advised to seek medical attention with urgency.

Leptospirosis is transmitted when water moistened soil, or vegetation (especially sugar cane) that has been contaminated with the urine of infected animals comes into contact with the skin, especially if the skin is abraded. The incubation period is usually 10 days but it has a range of 1 to 19 days. Leptospirosis may be excreted in the patient's urine for one month. However, direct transmission from person to person is rare.

Preventative measures are very important in the control of the disease. Some are outline below:



Educate the public on the mode of transmission like wading in potentially contaminated water, and in the use of protective gear when working or engaging in recreational activities.



Protecting workers in hazardous occupations by providing boots, gloves and aprons.



Recognize potentially contaminated water and soil.





Control rodents in human habitation, especially in rural and recreational areas.



Keep premises free of bulk refuse and practise proper storage and disposal of domestic waste.

I am aware that several persons in our churches engage in agriculture for leisure, or as a means of supplementing their income. My hope and pray is that none of us will become casualties of this disease.

Have you been in for a service lately?

car is due for a service every 3 months or 10,000 km. This is to prevent any damage and maintain optimum performance.

The garage that services your vehicle changes parts that become worn, over time and changes the oil, oil filter, air & fuel filter,



spark plugs etc. as part of the maintenance recommended by the manufacturer of the vehicle. If this service is neglected, the car can lose power as it burns more oil and fuel, emits more smoke and generally has unnecessary squeaks and noises; and may ultimately stop working.

Just like a car, we too need a regular service (every six months) to ensure that our bodies have energy and work efficiently. We typically service the outside of our bodies daily through bathing, brushing our teeth, and combing our hair, but often fail to service the inside of our body. With poor diet and eating habits our filters get clogged over time, and just like the car our performance deteriorates. Unlike a car, we cannot change our filters, but we can flush and clean them regularly for better performance.

The human liver performs about 500 different functions. It is the body's chemistry plant, regulating metabolic processes such as converting sugar (glucose) into energy (glycogen) and

protein (amino acids) into urea for excretion. The liver recycles red blood cells to remove iron from the dead cells. It also produces bile and stores vitamins and

produces blood clotting substances. The liver also acts as our filter and rids our body of toxins. When the liver becomes clogged with toxins, fats and parasites over time, the body's entire performance deteriorates and non-communicable diseases become unavoidable.

To name a few:

Cardiovascular Diseases, Hypertension, Food Allergies, Diabetes, Skin Disorders, Back Ache, Headache.

So you can see the liver needs assistance to cleanse itself to maintain and preserve better health and to keep the body at optimum performance. We typically eat too many acidic foods and enjoy foods that cause our bodies to be in an unsafe PH range (PH is a method of expressing differences in the acidity or alkalinity of a solution). Today's diet entails:

Processed Foods, Sugar, Junk Food, Smoke, Dairy, Animal Fats, Caffeine.

All these foods are main contributors to clogging the liver with thousands of gall stones which stops it from functioning properly. We usually think of gall stones as just one stone, because it's usually the largest that causes severe pain and has to be surgically removed. What about the thousands that manifest themselves in the liver? Are you going to allow them to grow and make you sick?

General Conference 2010: An experience worth remembering

y first impression of the Seventh-day Adventist 59th General Conference Session in Atlanta, Georgia was not a remarkable one. On the first day of the session, a couple thousand people gathered at the Phillip Centre. While the delegates from around the world registered at the church divisions booths, the attendees milled around with no sense of purpose.



As yet, the scheduled activities were not running and the exhibition stalls were still being set up. Nobody seemed to know what was really going on and I was beginning to question my presence at the session. However, the doubts of the first day were quickly dismissed when the programme got into gear.

The church's business was conducted in the Georgia Dome and each day's activities started and ended with devotions. Some of the most dynamic preachers from around the world delivered sound, well-researched messages on the Grace of God. The morning devotion by Pastor Steve Riley of Trinidad and Tobago was simple to understand and so well presented. Each session was preceded by musical selections from talented artistes (instrumentalists, soloists, groups and choirs). The programme was conducted in English, but transistor radios tuned to selected frequencies would allow the non-English speaking participants to hear the messages in a familiar tongue.

Some of the issues discussed by delegates and Conference Committee included global poverty, freedom of speech... On evenings, each world division reported on the work that it had accomplished during the five years since the last General Conference session. One of the most noteworthy reports was given by the North American Division. Some of the issues discussed by delegates and Conference

Committee included global poverty, freedom of speech and the defamation of religion, the nurture and protection of children and creation. Delegates also discussed matters related to ending violence against women and girls, while attendees were given the opportunity to sign a petition on the same subject.

While the delegates were cloistered in the Dome, the attendees were free to listen to the debates or take in activities elsewhere on the compound. Hundreds of men and women attended the sessions organised by the Women's Ministries Department. The presenters used a combination of technology, costume and in-character delivery to boost the meaning of the message of God's abundant grace.

For those persons who loved to browse, the exhibition hall was the ideal place. I soon learned that it would take a map, a keen sense of direction and great memory to navigate this area on a daily basis. There were over 300 booths in the hall with representatives from organisations across the thirteen divisions of the church. Visitors to the booths came into contact with fellow believers from around the world, among whom were workers from ADRA, noted evangelist and author John Carter, Russians dressed in national costume, television personalities Doug Batchelor and C.A. Murray, craftsmen displaying intricately carved woodwork from India as well as former and current members of the King's Herald Quartet. Many of the exhibitors spoke little or no English, so communication was often done with a few well-chosen words and lots of smiles.



There were many companies and groups, the names of which I had never known to exist. A wide variety of tokens were available from the booths to help familiarise the patrons with the goods and services being offered. Like me, many people took advantage of the free resource material, health surveys, massages, blood pressure and eye checks, as well as the breakfast that were distributed on a daily basis. The Southern Adventist University even offered bus rides and guided tours to its spacious, well-kept campus in Collegedale, Tennessee.

However, it was not all trawling for freebees by the attendees. Some booths offered specially invited guests the opportunity to give testimonies, render musical items or tell of their missionary experiences. This sharing was not restricted to the exhibition hall. Members participated in outreach programmes, attending musical concerts for the public and distributing thousands of pieces of literature to the residents of Atlanta.

All too quickly it was the final day of the 59th General Conference Session. Over 50,000 people of varying ages, ethnicities, nationalities and physical abilities assembled in the Georgia Dome to hear President Ted N. C. Wilson deliver a timely message that challenged the church to a revival of true godliness and humble submission to God. This short discourse was followed by the "Parade of Nations", where representatives from the 203 countries where Adventism is found marched in national costume and carried their country's flags.

That closing ceremony marked the end of a great session, and thousands of members bade farewell to friends, many of whom we may never see again. As I left the Dome I was filled with a sense of purpose, a far cry from the person who wandered aimlessly around the crowded hall on the first day. The experience showed me that God is always offering hope to



the weary sinner. Above all, I caught a glimpse of the end of time when God's children of every nation, kindred, tongue and people will assemble as a multitude that no one can number. Then, there will be no more need for conference sessions to plan strategies. Certainly, there will be no more goodbyes, because everyone will be home.


Touched by Jesus

Your Questions Answered





What is the difference between the moral law and the ceremonial law?

The ceremonial laws had to do with the sanctuary system. The Bible says that they were a "...shadow of things to come" (Hebrews 10:1). When Jesus died the sanctuary system was abolished and the ceremonial laws with it (Colossians 2: 9-14). The reason that this was done is that Jesus is now the real sacrifice and the real high priest ministering in the real sanctuary in Heaven (Hebrews 8:1, 2).

The moral law, on the other hand, will never be abolished (Matthew 5: 17-19). The moral law is based upon the Ten Commandments and can be summarised by the two great commandments: Love God with all your heart, soul and might, and love your fellowman as yourself. The moral law is extremely far-reaching and should guide our entire lives (Psalm 1).

JOURNEY INTO THE MIND OF GOD

Indeed, the very effort, determination and hard work required to bring such an idea to fruition, warrants commendation. May God be praised!


The questions begging therefore to be answered are:



Recipes

Fried Green Bananas

Cook bananas in skin with 1 table spoon of salt. Afterwards remove the skin and season with paprika, white pepper, cayenne pepper. Set the contents aside for 10 minutes.



Mix two beaten eggs with flour and bread crumbs. Coat the bananas with the mixture and fry them until they are lightly brown (The bananas will look like chicken necks when completed).

Green Banana Pie

Ingredients:

- 1 ½ lbs of green bananas
- ½ lb of okras
- √ ½ lb of cheese
- 1/4 cup of evaporated milk
- Dash of cayenne pepper
- 4 tomatoes
- ½ lb of salt fish (not boneless cod)
- Herbs: thyme, marjoram, parsley, oregano
- 4 onions, 6 sweet peppers, 1 garlic pod
- 1 beaten egg
- Bread crumbs
- 1 table spoon of Flora butter



Preparation:

Cook the bananas in the skin with a dash of salt until just firm enough to allow the fork to stick in. In the meantime rinse off the fish and soak for 10 minutes in a bowl with tap water.

Afterwards, rinse off the fish again and taste to see if it's just right (not too salty).

Prepare to frizzle out the fish and season it with ground up onion, sweet pepper, garlic, cayenne pepper and herbs. Set aside to marinate for 10 minutes.

Slice two tomatoes, two onions, two sweet peppers, two garlic pods and sauté this into a nonstick frying pan. Next add the seasoned fish and cook firmly. Set aside.

When the green bananas are finished let them cool before removing the skin. Then continue to cook the bananas with the okras, onions, garlic, sweet pepper and tomatoes; salt to taste.

Cook until the contents can be easily mashed.

Strain off the water and proceed to mash the green banana mixture along with butter, milk, and one beaten egg. Add cheese followed by fish to the mixture. Place the contents in a greased baking dish and sprinkle with bread crumbs. Bake for 35 minutes until brown at the top (bake for 45 minutes if prepared overnight).

- 6 oz breadfruit
- 2 oz white flour
- 3 oz sunflower butter
- 🖑 1 egg

Filling

4 oz carrot	4 oz fresh onions
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4 oz sweet peppers 1 tsp salt

1 tsp dry herbs 2 oz sunflower

4 oz cabbage 4 oz breadcrumbs & flour

Preparation:

- Cook breadfruit until soft. Mash with butter, egg and flour.
- Make into a ball and flavour well with dried herbs.
- Set aside.
- Sauté peppers, onions, cabbage and carrots.
- Make mashed breadfruit into small balls and flatten.
- Place filling in the middle of the flatten balls.
- Roll into a ball. Coat with breadcrumbs and flour.
- Deep fat fry until golden brown.
- Place on platter and garnish with parsley.
