ue to the increased knowledge on the importance of mental health in recent years, and because of our willingness to talk about mental problems rather than hide them away under the bed, there has been an upsurge of interest in the field of counselling. Man wants to know why people behave as they do. The depressed person is uncomfortable and wants to know what he can do for relief. Another person suffers from anguish of guilt. What can he do to rid himself of this burden? Parents want to know the best way to raise their children and wonder why their adolescents are so rebellious. The adolescent believes he sees through the "facade" of adults and is sceptical, but he, too, is confused and wants to understand himself. It is not surprising that many, many books in the field of counselling and child development have become best-sellers.

We Christians are not immune to the pressures of today's hectic pace, and more and more the Christian community is becoming interested in counselling. To this end, in the past decade alone, many skilful Christian counsellors have written books in an attempt to help Christian men and women understand their behaviour and solve their particular problem.

Many Christians want to know...

Many Christians want to know if in fact they should even have problems. An individual recently asked if a Christian could become a schizophrenic. What is more, Christians want to know why they should seek

help. Some muse over the relationship between doubts concerning their salvation, anxiety, and their personality types. Some Christians wonder why their sexual urges are so strong; they feel frustrated and ashamed, and they ask what they can do. They want to understand why they find themselves so easily entangled in unhealthy "co-dependent" relationships. These and other questions and problems are shared by very many Christians.



This world of ours is moving at a tremendously rapid pace. We as Christians, sensitive to those in the world, we will continue to find that we are not immune to this insidious affliction.

Christian counselling includes several fields- Ministers, Psychologists and Psychiatrists. These related fields need each other. The Minister has the biblical expertise that the others often do not have. The Psychologist has the tools for objective evaluation and the Social Worker often has special expertise in interpersonal relations. Often, they can greatly benefit the patient by working as a team, whether simultaneously or by referral from one to another.



What is meant by Christian Education?

- Christian education is not merely the use of methods.
- It is not limited to the Sabbath School Bible study.
- It is not limited to the Christian day school.
- It is not limited to the sermon.

Instead:

- It is the "school of the church".
- It gives careful consideration to all phases of the church's life and work.
- Christian education is education for Christian living.
- It should provide the necessary guidance for the total life style of the Christian.
- Christian education is crucially related to both the ministry of the church and the life of the individual Christian and must be built upon secure foundations.



What are the foundations of Christian Education?

Your Questions Answered





1. Isaiah 45: 7 states, "I form the light, and create darkness: I make peace and create evil: I the Lord do all these things." Does the Lord actually create evil?

Just as darkness is the opposite of light, the evil spoken of here means the opposite of peace.

It is not evil in the sense of wickedness, but God does things that disrupts peace. When God destroyed the earth with the flood that was not a wicked act and it was not a peaceful act.

2. Are hurricanes and earthquakes and other natural disasters from God or the devil?

God is sometimes the source of natural disasters. The Flood, the opening up of the earth in the wilderness, several famines in Old Testament times, etc. But other times natural disasters are from the devil. One example of this is the 'great wind' (possibly a tornado) that killed all of Job's children as found in Job 1:19. In that case God allowed it, but the devil sent it. Job 1:12.

When natural disasters occur in our times, it is usually not possible to know if God sent it or allowed it

3. Why does God allow so much evil?

God's ultimate goal is to have a universe where all the inhabitants will choose to love him and will never rebel against His leadership.

To achieve this goal everyone must clearly understand the consequences of sin and evil and choose to rebel or obey in love. As long as doubts about the consequences of sin and evil remain God will not eradicate them.

Unfortunately, it is a painful process; but we need to remember that it was more painful for Jesus than	it
could ever be for any of us.

Something to Ponder

Prior to 1888, Seventh-day Adventist believers must accept the teaching of "righteousness by faith". Prior to 1888, Seventh-day Adventist believers seemed to be leaning on the side of righteousness by works. They were constantly preaching about keeping the commandments of God, obeying the Sabbath and working to be approved by God. There was not much preaching about repentance, forgiveness, love, reconciliation or salvation.

By 1888, Ellet Waggoner and Alonza Jones put forward the doctrine of 'righteousness by faith' to the believers, but one must go back to the righteousness of Abraham to fully understand righteousness by faith.

The Apostle Paul writes in Roman 4:2,3

²For if Abraham were justified by works, he hath whereof to glory; but not before God.

³For what saith the scripture? Abraham believed God, and it was counted unto him for righteousness

One can only become righteous through faith in Jesus. No one can make himself righteous.

Righteousness cannot be bought and no one deserves it. It is a gift from God because God alone can freely give us this righteousness. Isaiah 64:6 reminds us that

"...all our righteousnesses are as filthy rags;"

What then is righteousness? Righteousness is rightness, it is right-doing. How can we who are sinful do right? The tendency to do right is not there for Isaiah 64:6 continues

"...we all do fade as a leaf, and our iniquities like the wind have taken us away."

Only the righteousness of Jesus can suffice us and this must be emphasized.

Righteousness can be divided into two sections i) imputed righteousness and ii) imparted righteousness. Imputed righteousness occurs when God takes away our sins and puts Jesus' righteousness within us. We then stand before God as though we have never committed a sin. We are made whole and clean, one hundred percent.

Imparted righteousness occurs every minute in our lives as Jesus gives us the will to fight off evil in all of its forms. One can remain righteous until the coming of Jesus, having his righteousness in us daily and even minutely. Imputed righteousness is similar to justification and imparted righteousness is the process of sanctification.

Faith is a strong belief or trust (New Oxford School Dictionary). Faith in God is a deep trust and hope in God, but faith in God causes one to do work for God. James 2:19-21 say

¹⁹Thou believest that there is one God; thou doest well: the devils also believe and tremble.

²⁰But wilt thou know, O vain man, that faith without works is dead?

²¹Was not Abraham our father justified by works, when he had offered Isaac his son upon the altar?

Your ultimate goal


Is just a step beyond

Stuffed Eggplant

INGREDIENTS:

- 4 Japanese oblong eggplant
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 lb. Protein granules
- 1 can crushed tomatoes or tomato sauce
- 1 yellow onion [chopped]
- 1/4 cup chopped green bell pepper
- 1/4 cup parsley
- 1 clove crushed garlic
- 1/2 teaspoon chopped fresh basil leaves
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh mint leaves
- Salt and pepper to taste

PREPARATION:

- Cut the eggplant lengthwise and scoop out most of the fleshy pulp and set aside. Salt the shells and set aside to make them sweat. Rinse off salt, gently squeeze and dry. Fry the shells in a tablespoon of olive oil until browned, and drain on paper towels. In a tablespoon of olive oil, brown off meat, add chopped onion and peppers. Then add the rest of the ingredients and the diced up eggplant pulp. Mix the ingredients together and fill the eggplant shells. Spread half of the tomato sauce on the bottom of a covered baking dish and place the filled eggplant shells on the sauce.
- Garnish two large tomatoes. Slice the tomatoes and arrange on top of the stuffed shells. Pour the rest of the tomato sauce over the shells and sprinkle with parmesan cheese. Bake in a preheated 350 degree oven for an hour.

Cheese Duo

Here's a side dish that really shines. The tasty cheese duo of Swiss and feta makes a perfect partner for garden-fresh zucchini.

INGREDIENTS:

- 4 medium zucchini, halved lengthwise
- 2 teaspoons olive oil
- 1 small yellow onion, finely chopped (about 3/4 cup)
- 3 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 1 1/2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 3/4 cup crumbled reduced-fat feta cheese
- ▶ 1/4 cup shredded reduced-fat Swiss cheese
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley
- 1 large egg, lightly beaten
- 2 egg whites, lightly beaten
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper

PREPARATION:

Preparation Time: 15 minutes

Cooking Time: 30 minutes

Serves 8

- 1. Heat oven to 375 F. Spray a 13 x 9 inch baking dish with vegetable cooking spray.
- 2. Scoop out insides of zucchini, leaving a 1/2-inch shell. Reserve zucchini flesh. Place shells in prepared baking dish. Set aside.
- 3. Chop reserved zucchini. In a medium skillet, heat oil over medium heat. Add onion, garlic, and zucchini; sauté 5 minutes or until softened. Remove from heat.

- 4. In a medium bowl, combine flour, feta and Swiss cheeses, parsley, egg, egg whites, and pepper. Mix well. Add zucchini mixture; toss to combine.
- 5. Spoon mixture evenly into zucchini shells. Bake until heated through, about 30 minutes. Place on a serving platter. Serve immediately.

Legume Loaf

INGREDIENTS:

(Pea, Lentil, Bean, Garbanzo)

2 cups legume (peas, beans, lentils)

1 tablespoon margarine

1 cup chopped nuts 1/8 sage

1 cup whole wheat bread crumb

2 tablespoons chopped chives

2 eggs beaten

1/2 teaspoons. salt

1 cup sliced tomatoes

PREPARATION:

Sauté the chives in the margarine and add seasoning, salt and tomatoes. Combine the cooked and mashed legumes (or the nuts) and breadcrumbs. Put the two mixtures together, adding the eggs and mixing lightly. Pour into oil and oiled loaf pan. Bake for 45 minutes in a moderate oven (350 'F). Unmould and garnish with parsley or celery leaves. Serve with tomato sauce. (Tomato sauce may be made with one can of tomato soup lightly thinned with water or milk).





Proper use of the Washing Machine

the first step is to make sure the machine is level. If the machine is not level, while it is washing it will make a rumbling sound and move about the floor. The correct way to load the machine is to place the clothing clockwise around the base of the adulator. While loading, the clothes should follow each other (where the last piece of clothing ends the next one should begin).

The Adulator Should Go In One Direction Jeans and towels are very heavy and should be distributed in the machine evenly. If the machine is full of water and does not begin,



get two (2) buckets and remove the drain hose from the outlet. Lower the hose in the bucket and the water will drain out of the machine. Repeat this step until the machine is empty and then replace hose in the wall/wooden outlet.

If the machine does not start check the breaker panel.

The Technician should be called when:

- The machine receives the water but still the cycle does not begin.
- 2. The machine receives the water and releases without washing the clothing.
- 3. The machine receives water, washes, but does not rinse.
- The machine does not spin dry.
- The machine overflows when it takes in water.
- The machine stops after the wash but the tub keeps spinning.
- 7. The clothes in the machine come out stuffy.
- 8. The tub in the machine is leaning on one side.

1854 Cholera Outbreak in Barbados

n outbreak of cholera requires specific environmental conditions. These conditions existed in Barbados in 1854, Peru in 1999, and Haiti in 2010. Can a devastating hurricane or an earthquake produce these conditions in Barbados? The book Emancipation Sugar and Federalist in the West Indies 1833 -1870 by Claude Levy states that few towns can offer a greater accumulation of evils from good sanitary measures than this Bridgetown city. The water supply was polluted and fresh water was so valued that hucksters were able to sell it from private wells by the pint. Once regarded as the most opulent and attractive city in the British West Indies, Barbados was now crisscrossed by a disorderly patchwork of crooked muddy lanes. Because of the high urban mortality levels, Bridgetown was reported to be the most unsanitary town in the West Indies. Open canals and cesspools were used to remove sewage from the most expensive houses, gutters were clogged and offensive odours abounded.

As early as 1850 -1852 Cholera was in England and the West Indies. In 1851 the Public Health Act was passed regulating pig rearing and unsanitary conditions in the urban areas. Commissioners were appointed with powers of entry and inspection, and had the power to seize articles of food deemed unfit for human consumption. As cholera intensified in the region in 1853 the Over 20,000 deaths in commissioners were given extensive powers to search, investigate and enforce Barbados. public health laws. In spite of their actions the disease struck Barbados killing

more than 20,000 people in 1854, see Table 1.



Although the government of Barbados was tardy in taking measures to deal with the cholera threat there were some who wrote about it in the newspaper. In the press of November 11th 1850, a writer complained of the indolence existing, while it was as clear as the sun that a disease which is no respecter of persons will be suddenly upon us.

[The confidence, the false security in which the inhabitants of Bridgetown appear to be reposing, while cholera is so rapidly approaching. Consider removing]

The epidemic struck the island early in 1854 and by the end of June 20,000 people had perished, see Table 1 and Table 2. One writer suggested that the first person to die from cholera was John Costella a wealthy plantation owner and merchant. His son built the Montefiore fountain at Montefiore gardens in his memory. Another wrote that the first case of cholera came to Barbados via the steamship Dervent. Seamen from the ship who died from the disease included two Barbadians. The clothes of the Barbadians were given to a woman in Lightfoot Lane to wash and it was from this house that cholera spread throughout Bridgetown. From Lightfoot Lane it spread to Collymore Rock, Nelson Street, Mason Hall Street, Cheapside, Racoon Quarters, King Street, Church Village, Green Village and other localities in Bridgetown.




As the epidemic spread, doctors and an assortment of quacks would recommend a nostrum of various kinds for treating the disease; e.g. coffee and rum, bitters and Christmas bush, and common salts.

Wet lands in Barbados

There were several springs and ponds around the island where communities existed. In Bridgetown there was Beckles spring near the Bayland, and in Jemmott's Lane by the Constitution River there was swamp land. Other areas were Ribbits pond near Nelson Street, St. Mary's pond, and Murphy pond in the Emmerton area. Doctors discovered that persons feeding from the polluted water sources in St. Michael recovered by using and drinking water from outside the polluted area. When the epidemic abated in July 1854 Barbados was in chaos.

It was reported that the hero of the epidemic was a Bridgetown carpenter by the name of William Perkins who built coffins. It is said that he went fearlessly among the dead removing corpses and giving assistance when relatives were paralysed with fear. He also gave medicine and food to the poor and sick and attended the funerals for whom he built coffins. Mr. Perkins survived the epidemic but his wife was

management

- 1. Turn off the television, video, play-station and other entertainment devices when they are not being used.
